The summer of 2018 was a hummingbird, a trail of feathers in a haze of corn silk. But it isn't quite over yet, and there's plenty of work to get done before the dust settles. Nine months into the state's bicentennial year, the Illinois State Historical Society has pulled out all the stops to make the commemoration as memorable as possible. So far we've placed or scheduled 71 Lincoln portraits in county courthouses around the state, with 31 more to go before December 3. We have eight historical marker dedications between now and October 30. The Society's 2018 Centennial Awards will be handed out on Saturday, November 3 at the newly restored Illinois Governor's Mansion, and our three-part fall "Lunch and Learn" lecture series at the University of Illinois Springfield begins on September 26 and is all about the bicentennial.
